However, a slick move along Essington's backs got winger Andy Barker over and Cowmeadow converted to give the visitors a 14-3 lead at half time.

A good five-minute spell at the start of the second half brought Aldridge right back into the game as a second penalty from Large was followed by a fine individual effort from fullback Alex Yates with a try almost the length of the pitch.

Large converted and although a Cowmeadow penalty increased the visitors' lead to 17-13, Aldridge lock Eddie O'Neil crashed over from short range to give the hosts victory.

Rubery Owen oval ball exponents

THIS photograph harks back to the days when local companies catered for a multitude of sporting and recreational interests.

In this case, the company in question was Rubery Owen at Darlaston, and the sport in question was rugby.

Our thanks go to Sue Haycock of Cannock for sending this photograph in for publication. Like the other picture she sent to us a couple of weeks ago (Bilston Town Athletes), it includes her late partner Philip Rainsbury, who sadly passed away recently.

Writes Sue: "This picture is of the Rubery Owen 1st XV rugby club. Philip is the handsome man on the right of the back row, next to the man in a suit. It was taken, I believe, during the 1962/63 season. Philip was a founder member of the club, and became a Director of the fondly-remembered Darlaston firm.

"Fred, an old school friend who went to Stonefield School, Bilston, with Phil for a short time, was able to come to his funeral. He told me that the Rainsbury

brothers, of which there were four, were well known for their fitness and sporting prowess. Although they all moved away from their Black Country roots, they are still remembered and talked about today.

County

"Phil's brother Vic, who himself excelled at swimming and cross country running, recalls that Philip was an excellent rugby player, and that he played at county

level in the 7's, as well as playing for the Rubery Owen team.

Record

"As well as rugby, Philip enjoyed cross country and long distance running, boxing, swimming and fishing. He was very competitive, and during his National Service training in M.I.A, Philip held the British Army half mile record, a record which will forever stand, as the half mile race was replaced by the 800m the following year!"

Several of the Vice Presidents remember playing with Phil Rainsbury, the man mentioned in the story.

Another Rubery Owen legend from the early days is Mervyn James, second from the right in the front row. Mervyn was the first winner of the Ken Harris trophy (Player of the Year) and his name is

listed on the winners board in the clubhouse by the old photos.

Mervyn was a tough, hard tackling wing forward. His specialty was to punch the opponent next to him at the first line out. If he wasn't punched backed he carried on for the whole game. It was a different game in those days !!
